## **Professional Speakers**

Enlist industry professionals for speaking engagements in my classroom. These speakers add a dimension and credibility to the concepts I teach to students in the classroom.

In the Costa Rica Study Abroad program, professionals from various fields of journalism guide and/or lecture my students. This includes reporters from the Tico Times and Costa Rica News, as well as former reporters who have historically important stories to share with our students.

### Mentoring from Others

Actively seek out mentors in both the academic and professional worlds. Dr. Leara Rhodes has been of great value to me, as has Senior Lecturer Mark Johnson, as well as many other colleagues in the department/college. Some, like Nsenga Burton, have moved on, but left indelible impressions on me about the way they do journalism. We're still in touch.

I also maintain contacts with local and regional news writers and editors. The expertise and friendship of all of these professionals is invaluable to my creativity in the classroom. Lee Shearer and Don Nelson, both of the Athens Banner-Herald (onlineAthens.com) are long-time associates. Rebecca Burns, now of the Red and Black, has taught me about WordPress and online digital portfolio creation, as has Grady's Samantha Myer, who speaks each term to my classes about properly preparing their required online digital portfolios.

I have learned much from conversations with job candidates who I have interviewed during department hires over the last several years. What people are doing elsewhere is often what we can be doing here.

I follow multiple news sources online via Twitter and Facebook, where I find several of my former students who now work at papers and/or government/business organizations around the country. For example, Kathleen Ragan Folkerth is a reporter in Akron, Ohio, and Jennifer Kaufmann works in Washington, D. C. The work of these two and of other former students from Grady and from my time at The Pennsylvania State University, like Bob Brinkley, formerly of Newsday, and Mary Frank, with the Army Times, keep me aware of new developments in news coverage.

# Mentoring of Others

Maintain associations with graduate students who are hired as Teaching Assistants in the program. Furnish them with course syllabi, course outlines and exercises for their use in the classroom as requested. Counsel and coach them through what is usually a first-time teaching experience.

Regularly work with undergraduates on Independent Study courses as requested. Many students take my class as Honors Students.

# **Industry Tours/Interviews**

Tour area media outlets including print and broadcast facilities to interact with professionals on the job in order to keep up to date with industry practice and perspectives. Taking students on these trips gives them firsthand knowledge of media challenges and changes.

Red and Black has been helpful in offering tours to our students in an effort to recruit new writers and/or staff.

In Costa Rica, we tour the Tico Times newspaper in the capital city of San Jose, where reporters from the English language daily discuss the world of journalism.

#### Monitor Course Material

Monitor course content and structure of colleagues at other quality journalism programs. Review online sites of university journalism departments and notice advances or changes in teaching subjects and techniques and maintain knowledge of issues of concern at the university level. I routinely collect and study others' syllabi, both for the class I am teaching and courses other than the ones I teach. There is much to learn from my colleagues about law, ethics, environmentalism and business in the journalism realm.

## **Course Evaluations**

Utilize mid-course and end-of-course evaluations each term as means of fine tuning class structure, content, assignments, and assessment of student learning and participation. The evaluations of my classes by students have routinely been among the highest in the journalism department.

### New Teaching Materials and Methodologies

Continually incorporate new teaching methods as a unique means of conveying course content. Update lectures, exercises, and hands-on training with current examples based on news stories and latest online publishing upgrades. Employ news writing teaching techniques offered by Harvard University and other industry leaders.

Continue to share materials I have developed with other faculty teaching Jour. 3190. Many have offered thanks for having access to these supplements, which save them time and make uniform much of what we do in that class.
